The Perry County Power of Youth Council consists of sophomores, juniors and seniors from all three area high schools and provides them a chance to work together to improve their community.

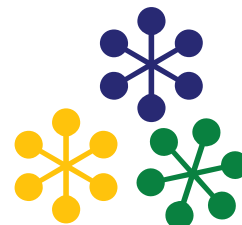
These sessions focus on volunteerism, leadership development, marketing, and fundraising and will culminate in a grantmaking activity to fund a local project.

1 The annuity payments are fixed and unaffected by the volatility of market conditions. You can count on receiving the same amount on every payment date.

2 The payment rates are very attractive, and rates are even higher for older donors.

3 The payments last a lifetime. It does not matter how long you live, your payments will keep right on coming, guaranteeing you that you will not outlive this stream of income.

4 Part of the payment amount is tax-free. This benefit lasts until you reach the normal age of life expectancy.

5 You receive an income-tax deduction when you obtain the annuity, and your estate may

benefit by having the asset removed from possible estate taxes.

6 Your gift annuity provides you with immense satisfaction, knowing that you have made a significant gift to your favorite charity.
